


How We Work Together

- Community-driven approach, created with and for communities
- Thinking about the region as a whole
- This is a forum and safe space for discussion on coordination, working together, sharing knowledge and expertise
- This is NOT a forum for political issues, compensation, litigation/legal disputes

What We Will Accomplish

- Provide tools to facilitate coordination, knowledge-sharing among participants
- Can support participants and capacity building but NOT run programs on behalf of participants
- Does not represent participants or advocate on behalf of participants to coordinate and better understand each other
- Plan the road ahead and move from priorities to action
- Create a legacy for long term stewardship of the James Bay/Hudson Bay region through the Tasiujaqiuaqmiut Sheewetaganapoi Consortium





Strategic Priorities

Five Strategic Goals have been established for the Consortium:

- Create a space for people to come together for the stewardship of Hudson Bay and James Bay
- 2. Ensure that communities and their knowledge play a <u>meaningful role</u> in the long term stewardship of Hudson Bay and James Bay
- 3. Bring attention to community priorities and work being done to address them
- 4. <u>Improve communication</u> between regions
- Encourage collaboration and relationship building





Community Updates & Priorities

Changing regional biodiversity:

- Increase in foreign species and a decline in local wildlife
- Calls to enhance animal population monitoring, particularly for seals, belugas, caribou, and polar bears.
- Key concerns include changes in migration patterns, animal health, and reduced access to traditional foods.

Climate monitoring:

- Changing landscapes and conditions compromise community safety, wildlife habitats, and access to traditional foods.
- Increase in monitoring is needed to adapt and support community safety and food security.

Climate shift:

- Rapid climate change, like thinning ice, thawing permafrost, and unpredictable weather, negatively impacts traditional hunting and harvesting practices and infrastructure.
- Dangerous travel conditions, observing local wildlife habitat loss and infrastructure damage.

Local capacity building:

- Aim to build capacity through partnerships, collaboration, and better resource allocation.
- Enhance capacity by engaging youth, passing on traditional knowledge, training young hunters, and monitoring local resources.

Community safety:

- Call to improve safety and infrastructure by mapping safe hunting trails, monitoring sea ice and flood risks, and maintaining winter road access.
- Further integration of traditional knowledge is key to effective safety and decision-making.

Environmental health:

- Concerns of rising waste and pollution impacting regional ecosystems and access to traditional foods.
- Existing recycling and waste programs need enhanced government support for long-term cleanup and protection.

Modern policies:

- Modern policies impact traditional ways of life and marine stewardship, such as hunting restrictions limiting access to traditional foods.
- Foster environmental protection and traditional practices through a collective approach to marine stewardship.

Indigenous governance:

- Advance Indigenous governance to balance development with environmental protection.
- Focus on youth education, integrating elders' wisdom, and holistic stewardship while asserting their inherent rights in development projects.



Industry impacts:

- Industrial activities, such as mining, shipping, and hydroelectric projects, disrupt wildlife habitats and hunting grounds, reducing access to traditional foods.
- Further involvement in policy-making and collaboration with industry to balance development with environmental and cultural protection.

Water monitoring:

- Call for further water monitoring due to changes in salinity, flow patterns, and water quality.
- Concerns regarding the impacts of contaminants, pesticide runoff, and dams.
- Local programs are necessary to monitor waterways, protect ecosystems, and assess environmental impacts on regional food chains.


