





Tasiujaqiuaqmiut Sheewetaganapoi Consortium is guided by a **Steering Committee** composed of individuals who have formally joined as members by providing a letter of support from their community or organization.

The Steering Committee comes up with a set of common objectives for the Consortium based on community priorities and concerns, helping raise a shared voice on strategies for addressing.

The internal governance for the Consortium is initially bottom-up, with communities setting the priorities and the Steering Committee helping to ensure these priorities are acted upon by the Working Groups and Secretariat.

We continue to invite interested organizations and individuals to join the Steering Committee.



We also invite interested participants to consider joining our Working Groups:


