Update 1: Save the Date - 2026 Summit

The 2026 Summit will take place February 24-26, 2026, in Ottawa, ON.

### Update 2: Working Groups (WG)

- **Communications**: Reviewing and assessing how to improve communications materials for community and youth outreach for the Consortium's 2026 Summit.
- Emergency Response: Secretariat drafting Terms of Reference (TOR) based on discussions and feedback to enhance and mobilize the region's emergency response. Next meeting will review the draft TOR.
- Community-Driven Research and Monitoring: Developing a work plan for the WG to guide its efforts. The WG will focus on the Project Map hosted on the

- Consortium's website to enhance accessibility and awareness of regional projects, and will further refine its objectives and criteria for the map.
- Indigenous Stewardship and Protected Areas Working Group: Discussing recent developments in Indigenous Stewardship, including the new SINAA agreement. The WG is actively planning programming for the Summit to help share these developments and facilitate interconnectivity of stewardship in the region.

From **Sanikiluaq**, **NU**, Lucassie Arragutainaq, co-chair and founding member of Tasiujaqiuaqmiut Sheewetaganapoi Consortium, has been honoured with the King Charles III Coronation Medal. Lucassie has spent decades advocating for Inuit knowledge, environmental protection, and community-led governance across Hudson Bay and James Bay.

This recognition reflects his profound dedication to the land, waters, and people of the region. Lucassie's leadership continues to inspire and guide the work of the Consortium and its many partners across Inuit and Cree communities. Congratulations to Lucassie!

From the **Cree Nation of Waskaganish**, **QC**, students at École Wiinibekuu School are deepening their connection to the Rupert River through the Mission eDNA project. In a recent classroom visit, Noémie from Génome Québec shared results from water samples collected last fall, revealing an incredible picture of the river's biodiversity.

Using environmental DNA (eDNA) analysis, students explored which fish and land animals leave traces in their local waters. The session sparked curiosity, built scientific awareness, and grounded learning in the lands and waters students call home.

Now in its third year, this partnership between Eeyou Marine Region, Génome Québec, and the Wildlife Board continues to make science meaningful and accessible for Cree youth, laying strong foundations for future stewardship across the James Bay region.

It marks a major step forward in Indigenous-led education and capacity-building across Eeyou Istchee.

Opportunity 1: 2025 Arctic Species Conservation Fund

■ Funder: WWF Canada

 Description: Supports stewardship and research initiatives focused on wildlife and habitats in the Canadian Arctic.

- **Deadline:** No application deadline; Proposals are accepted and reviewed on a rolling basis throughout the year.

#### **Opportunity 2: Indigenous Community-Based Climate Monitoring Program**

- Funder: Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs Canada (CIRNAC)
- **Description:** Supports First Nations, Inuit, and Métis communities in tracking climate change impacts, using both Indigenous Knowledge and Western science.
- **Deadline: First Nations:** Next intake expected Fall 2025; **Inuit:** Ongoing until funds are allocated.

#### **Opportunity 3: Climate Change Preparedness in the North**

- Funder: Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs Canada (CIRNAC)
- **Description:** Funds projects that increase resilience in Indigenous and Northern communities, focusing on infrastructure, safety, and food security.
- Deadline: No deadline; Ongoing until funds are allocated.

#### **Opportunity 4: First Nation Adapt Program**

- Funder: Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs Canada (CIRNAC)
- **Description:** Supports First Nations (south of 60°) in assessing and addressing climate risks like flooding, wildfires, and drought.
- **Deadline**: Ongoing until funds are allocated; however, 2025-2026 funding is limited.

#### **Opportunity 5: Northern Contaminants Program**

■ Funder: Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs Canada (CIRNAC)

- **Description:** Funds research on long-range pollutants affecting the Arctic and Indigenous communities. Focus areas include human health, environmental monitoring, and plastic pollution.
- **Deadline:** Next intake expected Fall 2025 for projects starting Spring 2026.
