Updates from the Secretariat

We are pleased to announce several updates from the Secretariat.

Update 1: Renaming the Hudson Bay Consortium!

 The Renaming Committee, made-up of Inuit and Cree Elders and language experts, carefully selected a new name for the Consortium. The Secretariat and the Communications Working Group are now finalizing the name and new logo to be launched this fall. Follow us on our social media for updates!

Update 3: New working group!

 Following the success of the recent roundtable in Winnipeg this February, we are now collaborating with Indigenous partners and government departments to launch a new Emergency Response Working Group this fall. Focus areas will be on both emergency response (for example, search and rescue) and environmental response (for example, oil spills). Working Groups Meetings

Community-Driven Research & Monitoring

Key points previously discussed:

- Mushkegowuk's Climate resilience project in Western James Bay and Hudson Bay started mid-June. Mushkegowuk is creating a community network and integrating SIKU for knowledge sharing and plan to present findings at the 2026 Summit.
- ArcticNet is organizing the Arctic Change conference in December in Ottawa; The call for Abstracts closes Sept 13.
- CERRI projects include testing contaminants in traditional food, studying intertidal biodiversity, finalizing protected areas with Inuit overlap, starting a greenhouse and STEM project for Chisasibi youth, and testing spring water quality.
- CNG and Parks Canada are conducting a feasibility study for NMCA's, emphasizing community governance and management, with a signing ceremony scheduled in August in Wemindji. The study ensures Cree participation in the creation of NMCA's.
- CIRNAC will have an upcoming release of a Climate Monitoring Guide focused on Indigenous methods.

Indigenous Stewardship & Protected Areas

Key points previously discussed:

- The group discussed the annual WG work plan, emphasizing the importance of presentations on conservation economies, stewardship, and connectivity.
 Recommendations for the work plan include:
 - Fisheries emerged as a common theme across various sites, highlighting the need for cross-site learning and collaboration.
 - Interest in collating information on Nunavut sites, including key contacts, and a suggestion for a presentation about the Nunavut Marine Council.
- Initiatives of Interest: Blue Economy Strategy (read more <u>here</u>) and Tallurutiup Imanga National Marine Conservation Area's What We Heard report. (Not yet published/available).

- The new logo is being developed by Beesum Communications, an Indigenous organization based out of Montreal. The artists are Inuk and Cree to reflect the collaborative effort between both Indigenous groups that inhabit the region.

From Rankin Inlet, the Canadian Coast Guard's Arctic Marine Response Station is open for the season. From June to October, crews will provide search and rescue services in the area during the open water season. Read more here.

From Nunavik, Makivvik released their Nunavik Climate Change Adaptation Strategy, marking a significant advancement in addressing the region's unique climate challenges.
